A huge thanks to John Mills our race officer who along with Rowley, Captain Yachts manage to set a challenging course each week. Our social events have again been well supported with many guest speakers, quizzes, talks, many musical events, carols with St Keverne Band.

Captain Amenities Report

In recent months various works have been undertaken to improve the ambience of the club. A working party of volunteers assembled and gave up their Saturday to fill a skip with all the junk accumulated over the last few years/decades, mainly around the bins. The car park was swept of the autumn leaves and several blocked gutters unblocked. A major visual improvement I think.

A hand rail has been installed from the top of the slipway to the bottom which has improved access to the pontoons for members of advancing years! The entrance road has been resurfaced and new car park drains installed at either end of the club house. A new glass roof for the Conservatory is currently being manufactured and should have been installed by the time you read this article.

Less noise when raining, much higher heat retention and all in all, a great improvement over the existing Polycarbonate roof. In addition the installation process will give us access to the defective lighting in the roof space. Also new white lines in the car park will have been remarked.

My main ambitions for the next year are to identify and apply a suitable wood treatment to the exterior of the building and replace the 15 remaining exterior single glazed windows with double glazed ones for obvious reasons.

The Bobby Martin Trophy for the 1st Yacht under 30" was awarded to Chris Clark on Grand Cru The wind was changeable, starting with a good breeze on the nose, which then went Westerly and variable near the French coast in the morning, the ultimate boat taking 3 hours to go six miles.

The 1st five yachts finished within within 32 minutes of each other, a credit to the handicap committee. Only two boats retired, one motoring

on to L'Aber Wrac'h, seeing seven pods of dolphins and two whales on the way and the other returning to Helford. The prize giving was held at the Yacht Club des Abers with a speech by David Kerlan, Mayor of Landeda & L'Aber Wrac'h and Rob Hewett, representing HRSC. Rob and Sue Hewett presented the prizes.

The race was preceded by an excellent Champagne recovery party, at HRSC, with great music by The Stowes and a tasty bar-b-que by Club caterers. The Cornish Food Hub.

Club Notice of Keel Racing

RULES & CONDITIONS OF ENTRY

1. Rules

1.1 Racing will be governed by the rules as defined in the Racing Rules of Sailing 2021 - 2024 (RRS). The sailing instructions may also change other racing rules. The changes will appear in full in the sailing instructions.

1.2 Nothing written in either this Notice of Race or the sailing instructions removes a boat's responsibility to comply with the Falmouth Harbour bye-laws, when sailing in the Falmouth Harbour designated area, see: www.falmouthharbour.co.uk/wp/wp-content/uploads/30-130-01-FHCByelaws.pdf.

2. Entries

- 2.1 Entries will be accepted only from owners or their representatives who are members of a PoFSA club, and have (where applicable) completed and submitted a valid entry form, paid the correct entry fee, and whose boat displays sail numbers in compliance with RRS Appendix G. Under sixteen year-olds may enter or crew only if their parent or guardian has given their permission and completed and signed the parental permission form provided.
- **2.2** Boats must race in their designated class and may not change class during a series.
- 2.3 The HRSC race committee reserves the right to alter/combine classes and change/adapt entry conditions as they see fit in light of entries received.
- 2.4 The Entry form can be found on the HRSC website and together with correct entry fee (where applicable) shall be submitted on-line or delivered by hand to:-

The Race Committee, HRSC, Helford, Helston, Cornwall TR12 6L

To be eligible to enter any race an Entry Form must be completed and submitted. For Wednesday evening Yacht Racing only one Entry Form need be submitted at the beginning of the season.

It is strongly recommended that all competitors download the RYASafeTRX app and register their vessel. This replaces the CG66 which is no longer valid. The app may be downloaded from the Apple Store or Google Play. Alternatively, competitors may register on the RYA website at www.safetrx.rya.org.uk.

3. Risk Statement

Rule 4 of the Racing Rules of Sailing states: "The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race or to continue racing is hers alone".

Sailing is by nature an unpredictable sport and therefore inherently involves an element of risk. By taking part in the event, each competitor agrees and acknowledges that:

- (a) They are aware of the inherent element of risk involved in the sport and accept responsibility for the exposure of themselves, their crew and their boat to such inherent risk whilst taking part in the event;
- **(b)** They are responsible for the safety of themselves, their crew, their boat and their other property whether afloat or ashore;
- (c) They accept responsibility for any injury, damage or loss to the extent caused by their own actions and omissions:
- (d) Their boat is in good order, equipped to sail in the event and they are fit to participate;
- (e) The provision of a race management team, patrol boats and other officials and volunteers by the event organiser does not relieve them of their own responsibilities;
- (f) For offshore races they are responsible for ensuring that their boat is equipped and seaworthy so as to be able to face extremes of weather; that there is a crew sufficient in number, experience and fitness to withstand such weather and that the safety equipment is properly maintained, stowed and in date and is familiar to the crew;
- (g) It is their responsibility to familiarise themselves with any risks specific to the venue or event drawn to their attention in any rules and information produced for the venue or event and to attend any safety briefing held for the event;
- (h) Helford River Sailing Club cannot provide patrol boat/safety boat cover for the duration of the racing.

4. Sailing Instructions

- **4.1** Sailing Instructions will be: a. posted on the Helford River Sailing Club website and Helford River Sailing Club Yacht Racing Facebook page and may be downloaded. b. available for collection at the Club.
- **4.2** Instructions for Special Races and Notice of Racing for individual events will be posted on the HRSC website and on the HRSC Yacht Racing Facebook page.

5. Prizes

These are all detailed in the Sailing Instructions, which are available prior to entry, see 4 above.

6. Sailing Programme 2024

The proposed Sailing Programme is Appended to the Yacht Racing Sailing Instructions.

7. Classes

Generally, Yacht Racing will be run as a single Handicap Class. If the number of entries for any one race exceeds 15 the Race Committee reserve the right to group boats into separate classes and run multiple starts.

Where possible, details of classes split will be posted on

the HRSC website and Facebook pages.

8. Courses

- **8.1** All Series and Special races: Helford River and Falmouth Bay.
- **8.2** Offshore races: Western Approaches, English Channel, Plymouth forecast area.
- **8.3** Start times for all races are published in the sailing instructions.

9. Handicaps

- **9.1** For Wednesday evening Series racing, the Race Committee will use the RYA YTC rating to establish handicaps.
- **9.2** Entrants shall forward a copy of their RYA YTC rating certificate with their entries. 9.3 In the absence of an RYA YTC handicap rating, the Race Committee reserve the right to determine and allocate handicaps based a IRC rating (if provided) or upon similar boats with known handicaps as they see fit.

10 Series Racing

- 10.1 Spring Series (7 Races) from 8th May until 19th June
- **10.2** Summer Series (7 Races) from 26th June until 7th August
- **10.3** Late Summer Series (6 Races) from the 21st August until 25th September.

11 Offshore Racing Safety Requirements

Note: For Off-Shore Races and race specific NOR/SIs take precedence over the HRSC NOR/SIs

- 11.1 Offshore racing: The safety of the boat and its entire management including insurance shall be the sole responsibility of the owner/competitor who must ensure the boat is fully found, thoroughly seaworthy, operated by a crew sufficient in numbers and experience who are physically fit to face bad weather. The owner/skipper must be satisfied that:
- **11.1.1** The Hull, Hull Appendages, Spars, Rigging, Sails and all gear are sound.
- **11.1.2** All Safety Equipment is properly maintained, stowed and in date.
- **11.1.3** The crew know where such equipment is kept and how it is to be used.

All Classes World Sailing Offshore Special Regulations for Inshore Racing

At the discretion of the Race Committee, boats complying with the following minimum requirements may be permitted to race. Boats shall be self-righting from 90 degrees. And the cockpits shall be self-draining. If class rules provide a higher standard, then class rules apply.

11.2 Below is a list of safety equipment to which all competing boats must comply. Each item of equipment shall function properly and be suitable for its intended purpose in the size of boat on which it is carried.

Each item shall be securely stowed and ready for immediate use. Any additional equipment required by class rules must also be carried.

- 1. Suitable anchor
- 2. Fire extinguisher if fuel or gas carried
- 3. Horseshoe type lifebuoy or life sling
- 4. Bucket and lanyard
- Personal flotation devices for each crew (Note: it is not compulsory to wear them)
- 6. Marine compass
- 7. VHF radio with suitable marine Channels
- 8. Powerful torch /spare batteries
- 9. Suitable flares (or LED flares)
- 10. Whistle and Fog Horn
- 11. Bilge Pump
- 12. Working auxiliary Engine
- 13. First Aid Kit

12. Radio Communication

Except in an emergency, a boat shall neither make radio transmissions while racing nor receive radio communications not available to all boats. This restriction also applies to mobile telephones.

13. Insurance

Each participating boat shall be insured for racing including third-party liability insurance with a minimum cover of £3,000,000, (three million pounds).

14. Race Committee

The Race Committee members will be Commodore, Vice Commodore, Hon. Captain Sailing and Race Officer of the day.



Dinghy Sailing Instructions

Rules

Racing will take place under the current World Sailing (formerly ISAF) Rules , with RYA Prescriptions, these sailing instructions, the appropriate class rules, and the Notice of Races.

1. Risk statement

The responsibility for a boat's decision to participate in a race, or to continue racing, is hers alone.

Sailing is by its nature an unpredictable sport, and therefore inherently involves an element of risk. By taking part in the event, each competitor agrees and acknowledges that:

- i) They are aware of the inherent element of risk involved in the sport and accept responsibility for the exposure of themselves, their crew and their boat to such inherent risk whilst taking part in the event.
- ii) They are responsible for the safety of themselves, their crew, their boat and their other property whether afloat or ashore.
- iii) They accept responsibility for any injury, damage or loss to the extent caused by their own acts or omissions.
 iv) Their boat is in good order, equipped to sail in the event and they are fit to participate
- v) The provision of a Race Management Team, patrol boats and other officials and volunteers by the event organiser does not relieve them of their own responsibilities.
- vi) The provision of patrol boat cover is limited to such assistance, particularly in extreme weather conditions, as can be practically provided in the circumstances.
- vii) It is their responsibility to familiarise themselves with any risks specific to this venue or this event drawn to their attention in any rules and information produced for the venue, and to attend any safety briefings for the event.
 viii) They are responsible for ensuring that their boat is
- viii) They are responsible for ensuring that their boat is equipped and seaworthy so as to be able to face extremes of weather, that there is crew sufficient in number, experience and fitness to withstand such weather, and that the safety equipment is properly maintained, stowed and in date and is familiar to the crew.

2. Entry and insurance

The owners / helmsmen of all dinghies wishing to take part in races must do the following:

i) Insure their craft for a minimum of £3,000,000 third party risks

- ii) Complete, sign and return an official Entry Form to the Club for 2022 before racing, (available from the Club Administrator or Captain of Dinghies or from the Club Website).
- iii) Pay the required entry fees to the Club Administrator iv) Under 16's must complete a Parental consent form available from the Club Administrator, or the Club Website.

No points or places will be given to any competitor who fails to satisfy all of these requirements.

3.Safety

Life jackets or buoyancy aids must be worn by all competitors at all times. All dinghies must be equipped with adequate buoyancy, (properly secured), and carry all safety equipment. It is the responsibility of the competitors alone to decide whether or not it is safe to race. This includes an assessment of weather conditions and forecasts, the sea worthiness of their vessel and the competence, experience and fitness of its crew. Such standards may vary and the fact that a race has not been cancelled does not mean that it is safe for all competitors to take part.

4. Novice Class

There may be a class for novices starting 5 minutes before the main start. Helms persons wishing to enter this class shall declare this on their entry form and notify the Race Officer prior to leaving the pontoon and there must be at least three starters. If less than three novice starters they shall start with the main class start.

5. Courses

Courses will be either:

i) Pursuit

The course to be sailed may be signalled by course letter board hung at the foot of the ramp leading to the pontoons. Details of courses are given on race cards available from the Club Office and Captain Dinghies. Competitors should ensure they use the most up-to-date card by checking the valid date on the card with that on the Club Notice Board.

ii) Committee Boat Line Start

Letter "A" may be displayed at the foot of the ramp. The course letter board may be displayed from the Committee Boat before the Warning signal. Courses may be selected from the race card, Committee Boat Line Start section.

iii) Windward/Leeward/Triangle Courses

Letter 'B' may be displayed at the foot of the ramp. The course may be standard windward/leeward triangle as illustrated in the Racing Rules of Sailing, with an option to reduce the number of laps by shorten course procedure and an option to use the windward and leeward marks as starting and finishing marks.

iv) Average Lap Timed Races

Where possible & convenient races will be raced under the Average Lap Time system. Letter "C" may be displayed at the foot of the ramp.

v) Light winds

a light wind course option may be signalled by letter board Lat the bottom of the Ramp, or on the committee boat. A suitable light wind course will be notified by Captain Dinghies or the Race Officer.

vi) Dynamic Courses

Letter "D" may be displayed at the bottom of the ramp. The Race Officer will devise the course, which may be displayed on the side of the Committee Boat.

6. Starting

i) Pursuit

A signal will be sounded at or soon after the start time published in the HRSC Year Book, or otherwise advised elsewhere. Each dinghy will start at its own individual start time shown on the race card after this sound signal. The start line is the Club Line marked by the transit of the two masts at the clubhouse, with Bar buoy as the northern limit.

ii) Committee Boat Line Start

The starting procedure will follow RRS 26, pg 20 with the warning signal at or soon after the time published in the HRSC Year Book, or otherwise advised elsewhere. In addition there may be a signal 5 mins before the warning signal, and Int. code Flag 'B' will be hoisted. Flag 'B' will be lowered at the Warning signal, and then RRS 26 will be followed. Alternatively & at the discretion of Captain Dinghies there will be a 3 flag start for a simplified procedure if indicated either for novice racers or merged safety: committee boat operations. The start line will be a line between an orange flag on the Committee Boat and a pin mark which may be a laid mark with an orange flag, or a mark of the course. The start line will be in the vicinity of the Start Mark, identified in brackets on the race card.

7. Number of starters

For a race to be valid the number of starters must be at least two.

8.Finishing

i) Pursuit

The finish will be at the first mark, rounded by the leading boat after a minimum time period (hitherto 90 mins) has expired. If the full course is completed before this time then the legs marked in brackets on the Race Card will be repeated until the minimum time period has elapsed. The finish may or may not be marked by a Committee or patrol boat. The finish line is deemed to be a line extending from the finish mark, at right angles to the course from the previous mark. The finish mark should be left on the same side as it would have been rounded. There will not be a hook finish. The length of the line will be two boat lengths. Any boat not on the same leg as the lead boat when the minimum time period expires shall finish by rounding the next mark on the correct side. The Committee Boat or patrol boat will attempt to record finishing positions. However, it is essential that competitors note the name / sail number of the boats finishing ahead and astern.

ii) Committee Boat Line Start.

The finish line will be marked by the Committee Boat and a mark of the course.

The line will be at 90° to the course from the previous mark.

Boats will finish by crossing the line leaving the mark of the course on the correct side according to the Race Card. To indicate that the Committee Boat is on station it may fly a blue flag.

The Race Officer will finish the race after approx.

60 mins duration, at a mark of his/her discretion, by following the shorten course procedure. The course may be shortened between marks of the course by creating a finish gate between a blue flag displayed on the committee boat and an additional mark displaying an orange flag, and by following the shorten course procedure before the first boat crosses the finish line.

iii) Windward/Leeward Triangle Races.

The finishing procedure will be as per SI 9ii above (Committee Boat Line start Race)

9. Shortening course

In accordance with RRS 32.2, except as modified by these Sailing Instructions.

10. Retirements

All competitors retiring must notify the Race Officer or Patrol Boat Crew as soon as possible.

11. Time limits

Committee Boat line start and Windward/Leeward/ Triangle line start races. Any boat not finishing within 30 mins of the leading boat will be deemed to have retired.

12. Protests

Will be heard in accordance with WS Rules 60 – 71.4. This procedure must be followed correctly and in full, or the protest may not be heard.

13. Assistance to another boat It is the duty of every dinghy to render all possible assistance to any vessel or person in distress in accordance with Fundamental Rule 1.1. Helping Those in Danger. The Race Committee will subsequently make every effort to reach an equitable decision regarding the outcome of the race in accordance with Rule 62.

14. Scoring

RRS Appendix A pg 54 will apply. Additionally, the Race Officer shall be awarded his average points scored in the other races in that series.

15. Alternate Rigs Helms and Boats

Lasers shall be allowed to use Standard, Radial or 4.7 rigs for any race.

In the event of a change of helms person in any series, the race results points shall be awarded to the boat and not to the individual helms person.

Helmsmen may helm any boat in any series and the scores shall be attributed to the helmsman.

16. Handicapping

Handicapping will be organised using the Portsmouth Yardstick Scale as determined by the Sailing Committee. All entries shall adhere strictly to their respective class rules and to their PY rating.


17. Use of Club Boats

Club boats may only be used for racing by helmsmen who have been previously authorised to do so by Captain Dinghies and only when a safety boat attends.

Users of club boats must take all steps to avoid damage. At the end of racing the boats should be returned to their moorings or the dinghy park, properly secured with sails properly folded and returned to the store. Any damage must be reported promptly to Captain Dinghies or Race officer.

Jetty

The jetty is for Club members to launch small boats and carry out minor repairs, between tides. Electricity is provided at the bottom of the ramp.

Members wishing to bring their Keelboats alongside must book their vessel in the log kept at the club bar. Unless there are exceptional circumstances, yachts will not be allowed to remain alongside for longer that 24 hours.

Boats or cars must not be parked on the top of the jetty at any time, or boats tied alongside other than for short periods.

Boat stickers

All vessels on HRSC premises must display their current boat sticker. Please note all boat stickers will be numbered and registered for identification purposes.

Dinghy park

The Dinghy park is available for dinghy, kayaks, canoes and paddle boards. A waiting list operates for members who wish to join the waiting list should get in touch with the club office. They will get in touch with you when a space becomes available.

Finger Berth

Finger berths for vessels over 3.25m are pre-allocated to existing berths holders each year. The maximum boat length is 5m and the beam no wider that 2m, the weight of the boat (loaded) should be under 450kg. Engine maximums are 2 spoke 90hp, 4 stroke 75hp. A waiting list operates and is strictly adhered to. Members who wish to joint the waiting list should get in touch with the Club office.

Treasurer's Report

Trading Account

This last year we have achieved a healthy **Net Surplus before tax** on the Trading Account of £56,928 which is almost 35% up on the previous year. Looking at the club's operating margin from all club activities, that is adding back depreciation which is a paper figure, we achieved an **operating margin** of £81,066 which is the highest ever recorded by the club. However if we adjust that figure for inflation, 2013 would have been slightly higher at £89k.

Membership was a success story as the previous year. New members continued to join us throughout the summer resulting in a £2k increase compared to 2022.

The Bar performed well, contributing £18.2k margin, less than last year largely through increased staff wage rates and a policy of keeping bar prices at very attractive levels for members. The club was very active during the summer, benefitting from many visitors which helped to boost the bar and catering margins.

The margin from **Moorings** was £32k higher than 2022 which looks excellent but is mainly because pontoon repairs were not carried out as budgeted and are now being undertaken in January and February 2024. The expected cost is likely to total £50k. **Overhead costs** have steadied after the large increase last year. Insurance has risen by £3k largely due to the continuing hike in building material prices which affect our rebuild cost should the unthinkable occur.

Balance Sheet

We closed the year in a strong cash position with £250,242 between all accounts. The aim now is to keep around £10k in the general account and move any surplus into the other interest bearing accounts. Unlike the figures at September 2023, we now have c. £65k in the pontoon fund, c. £20k in the fabric fund and c. £180k+ in reserves. These figures represent the budgets for pontoon and fabric. Whereas in the year to Sep 2022 we earn't just £13 interest, in 2023 interest rates went up and as I write we are earning about £230 per month.

On the negative side of the Balance Sheet, liabilities were higher by over £36k but this is not critical - at the year end, I brought forward the purchase of a new safety boat for £29k, to reduce corporation tax.

Finally but certainly not least, the most important single figure in the accounts - **Net Assets** - **have risen by £54,335** to £759,648.

The budget for the year to September 2024 includes a lot of maintenance – resurfacing the driveway, white lining the carpark, pontoon chains and anchor replacement, new conservatory roof as it is leaking and tidying up the outside of the club so profit is going to be considerably less but these improvements are necessary and we have the funds to carry them out.

HRSC Byelaws

- 1. The Club premises shall be open during such hours as the General Committee shall direct, the hours of opening to be displayed from time to time on the Club notice-board.
- 2. When social functions are held at the Club and on other occasions when high attendance by Members, their guests and visitors is expected, there shall be in attendance and in charge of the Club premises an Officer, a member of the General Committee or a member appointed by the Amenities Sub-Committee. The Member in charge shall be responsible to the General Committee for the proper conduct of the Club premises for strict adherence to the permitted hours and for security.
- 3. The bar opening hours shall be the permitted hours for the Licensing District or such extended hours as the General Committee shall decide and the Licensing Justices permit.
- 4. Members must discharge every expense and liability incurred at the Club premises before leaving and no credit will be given to members under any circumstances.
- 5. Members' cheques may be cashed in the Club premises at the bar, provided that sufficient cash is available and that the request is accompanied by a valid cheque card. The amount of cash shall not exceed the stated limit of the cheque card and only one transaction shall be permitted on any one day. Post dated cheques will not be accepted.
- 6. Members shall not bring dogs or other animals into the Clubhouse at any time. Dogs and other animals are only allowed on the Club premises on a lead and attended. No such animals may be left unattended in parked cars on Club premises when the owner(s) are not on Club premises. This shall not apply to Members with guide dogs (addition).
- 7. The General Committee may at any time fix a charge for the parking, berthing or mooring of boats on Club property.
- or mooring of boats on Club property.

 8. All boats, outboard motors, paddles etc. kept on Club premises, on Club moorings, pontoons, dinghy parking areas, adjoining beaches or in the car park shall be clearly marked with the member's card number. This shall be displayed so that it is clearly visible and not covered by sails or boat covers.

 Membership card numbers, if lost or mislaid, are available only from the Club Administrator, by personal enquiry or by

post, for security reasons.

- **9.** All boats using Club premises or participating in any Club event or using Club mooring facilities shall be insured for third party risks. The amount of cover shall be £2,000,000.
- **10.** No Member shall carry on a trade or profession from the Club premises, or using Club facilities.
- 11. A Member wishing to hire Club premises shall have been a Member for a minimum of 12 months. Applications shall be sent to the Honorary Secretary in writing. Club activities shall always take precedence over any Club hiring application. Applications which can be construed as a fund raising or profit making event for an outside organisation or a business will not be accepted. It is a condition of hiring the Club premises that the Member enters into a standard written contract with the Club which sets out basic conditions of hiring, including agreement to purchase all catering and drinks through the Club. Hiring fees shall be fixed by the General Committee.
- 12. In addition to the powers given by the Committee under Rule 17, if at any time fees payable to the Club by any Member or any former member shall be in arrears, and a vessel the property of a member or former member remains on the Club premises, the Committee may:
- (a) Remove the vessel without being liable for any loss or damage to the vessel howsoever caused.
- (b) Give one month's notice in writing to the Member or former member at the last known address as shown in the Club register, and thereafter sell the vessel and deduct any monies due to the Club (whether by way of arrears of subscription or annual payments, mooring, dinghy park fees or otherwise) from the proceeds of sale before accounting for the balance (if any) to the Member or former member.

 (c) Alternatively, if the vessel is unsaleable, after giving notice as aforesaid, dispose of the vessel in any
- aforesaid, dispose of the vessel in any manner the Committee shall think fit and deem the cost of so doing and any arrears as aforesaid to be a debt owing to the Club by the member or former member. Provided always that:


Proper evidence is available to show that all reasonable steps have been taken to trace a Member or former member and that when and if the vessel is sold, the proceeds of the sale (less any indebtedness by the member or former member of the Club) shall be placed upon bank deposit account and retained against the eventuality of a claim by the owner (whether he be the said Member or former member or otherwise) for a period of 6 years.

- (d) The Committee reserves the right to relet any mooring or berth that is not used. Only the nominated boat shall occupy an allocated berth. The holder shall advise the Committee if a berth is to remain unused by the authorised boat for any period in excess of two weeks. The Committee may temporarily re-allocate any such berth and make an appropriate charge.
- 13. Between the 1st April and 30th November each year a store is available, the use of which is restricted to storage or engines and paddles. All such items shall be clearly marked with the owner's membership number as per Bye-Law 8. Members' property shall be stored at members' own risk and the facility shall only be used upon payment of the appropriate annual fee.
- 14. At the end of each Club sailing season and not later than 30th November all Members' boats and equipment shall be removed from the Club premises. Boats on the pontoon and in the dinghy park shall have been removed by an earlier date, published in the newsletter or on the Club notice board to enable the pontoon to be dismantled and stored in the dinghy park area. Members' boats (and equipment) may not be returned to the Club premises until the new season's mooring/pontoon fees have been paid. Only the nominated boat shall occupy an allocated mooring, pontoon berth or dinghy park space
- **15.** Club-owned dinghies may only be used when permission is granted by Captain Dinghies or Adult Sailing.
- 16. Two weeks' notice shall be given to the Club Administrator before occupation of an allocated mooring, pontoon berth or dinghy park space commences. If such an allocation will be unused for a period of more than two weeks during the season, the Committee may re-let any unused allocation and make an appropriate charge
- 17. The Committee reserves the right to put a chain across the slipway and restrict access at certain times, particularly when junior sailing activities are taking place. Emergency access will always be available.

 18. Members, Single or Joint, but not
- Junior or Family Junior Members, may apply to the Club Administrator for one finger berth per membership, or to be placed on the waiting list. No member, Single or Joint, may have more than one finger berth. A Cadet member, on being allocated and accepting a finger berth, cannot remain a Cadet member. This Bye Law applies annually and is retrospective only in that a finger berth will not be allocated to any Junior or Junior Family member, and any Cadet Member accepting

a finger berth will be required to pay the

full Single Membership fee.



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
