As many of you will be aware the tidal surge, caused by Storm Emma on 1st March, caused a lot of damage to the pontoon, the heart of the Club's infrastructure. Then, the following day, a tree trunk was swept under the seaward pontoon. I am pleased to confirm that our insurers and the underwriters have reported that the loss is recoverable and have no objection to us authorising Falmouth Divers to commence work on the repairs, which we hope will start on Monday 26th March.

However the Club will be paying for elements considered to be part of general maintenance. Therefore we will be organising fundraising events to contribute towards this extra expenditure throughout the year.

I am pleased to see that our new stewards Alex and Patrizia are settling in so well. They are both good chefs and I am encouraged to see the Club is now busy with Members enjoying their food and drink. Also please can Members put their rave reviews on Facebook plus any pictures or videos. The more wonderful images we have on the site, the more it will attract new Members.



Dinghies Spring Report

Writing on 2nd March after 6 inches of snow evaporated last night at Treworval, whisked away by a balmy 2-3C force 7 gusting 11 we are amply reminded that Spring doesn't start until the 20th March. Commodore John Bolitho needed no reminding as he headed up the team to salvage the eastern arm of the Club's pontoon. A Spring tide and maximum exposure to an easterly was the "perfect storm" in the Helford.



The old adage about March being "in like a lion out like a lamb" was certainly true this year. In this part of Cornwall we hardly ever get any snow due to the microclimate created by the Gulf Stream. Well it didn't hold true this year thanks to "The Beast from the East". With snow forecast for west Cornwall for 28th February and forward it certainly came down and created a picture rarely seen in the area with many roads impassable and cars abandoned everywhere. It was a bit chaotic to say the least and all happened as was predicted by the meteorologists. The next prediction was Storm Emma!

Storm Emma was due to hit us on 1st March during the night and hit us it did! I slept through the storm and saw nothing untoward as I carried on with my work. A phone call at 8.30am told me of the damage to the Sailing Club and the village of Helford. I called my son Ed to go down to Helford to see what could be done and John Bolitho, the Commodore, was there along with a few other Club Committee members who started the clear up.

Nine dinghies had been washed off the dinghy park and all of them had been secured to the dinghy racks which are all bolted to the concrete. Many of these racks were ripped from the concrete and washed along with the dinghies off the dinghy park into the maelstrom that was the Helford River. There is evidence of the water one metre above the dinghy park.

The other damage to our Cub was to the pontoon. The storm surge that seemed to have raced up the river had lifted the pontoon off the pile which holds the bridge end secure. This then caused the bridge to come off the pontoon and damage one of the floats.

What no-one could ever have imagined was that the ground anchors that hold the pontoon in place were pulled from the river bed causing the eastern side to swing around and come into contact with the western side.

A few of us there made a decision to make the pontoon as secure as we could while the tide was out. We secured the two arms to stop them colliding and we then took into consideration what damage may be caused by the bridge. It could be considerable with the swell still strong in the river and the thought to remove the bridge was sound which we did, the hinge pins knocked out and the bridge lifted down with a telescopic handler and placed on the dinghy park awaiting the repairs. Thanks must go to all helpers, many staying til all was as secure as it could be and repairs are programmed in for this coming week.

While we suffered damage it was as nothing compared to some other places, St. Anthony was hit extremely hard with large boats washed onto the road. Porthallow, Porthoustock and Coverack also suffered damage. Probably the worst pictures I have seen are from Holyhead in North Wales which show damage comparable to a hurricane.

Our thoughts are with all those now in the process of clearing up the devastation caused by Storm Emma.





Three months into the 2018 HRSC year and my role as Rear Commodore Sailing, the recent storm has been a baptism of fire but hopefully all repairs will be completed very soon.

Each Captain: Dinghies, Yachts, Safety Boats, Wayfarers, Juniors and Water Activities is getting his or her calendar in place to have a continuous programme of sailing each and every week of the season

Although our keelboat fleet has been somewhat light for a few years we are hoping with some new ideas and innovative ideas from Captain Yachts, Dom Brandreth, that we may encourage a few more out for some casual racing. It need be only as competitive as you wish or even only a social cruise around a course within our race area.

Captain Dinghies has completed the dinghy calendar for the season, again with some longer races, maybe even going abroad to St Mawes!

The rescue boats are pivotal to dinghy sailing and used on an almost daily basis in one role or another so to keep them running is of paramount importance to the sailing season.

The Wayfarer fleet has in the past run itself with the enthusiastic crews who run the sessions and maintain the fleet. This group has in the past year encouraged many people to come down on a Saturday to sample sailing which was a great success with up to 20 people sailing on some weekends. With the increase in the use of these Club boats it was suggested we elect a Captain Adult Sailing to represent the group on the Committee.

Another new post on the Committee is Captain Water Activities. The amount of kayaks on the river and used by so many is evidence of the growing interest in other water activities and this, along with paddle boarding, will I'm sure continue to grow year on year.

The junior sailing sessions on Friday evenings are a sight to behold with 30 odd juniors out on the water plus 8 to 10 volunteer dinghy instructors. Teaching them is a logistical challenge which is handled very efficiently by Captain Juniors Nick Glossop along with our ground crew checking sailors in and out at the start and finish of each session.

The five new instructors trained last year has made a huge difference to the team. Kitty Brogden, Ed Hosken, Rebekah Hosking, Jim Lee and Megan Williams are an enthusiastic group who have added a new dynamic to junior sailing all working with the "more mature instructors" (older) and experienced working together. I as Senior Instructor take an overview of the sessions each week assessing all aspects of the training. Sometimes I motor around, sometimes I sail with the different groups which is an enjoyable way of seeing how the training is progressing.

The RYA's 'Push The Boat Out' event will be taking place again this year. This is to promote sailing and water activities taking place throughout the country at dates throughout May. HRSC will be holding this on 26th May from 1200 hrs onward when we will have opportunities for anyone to have a go at different types of sailing. We may also have more activities through the week which will be advertised on the HRSC website.

I hope to see many of you in the clubhouse during the season. It is a privilege to represent the members of the Club as Rear Commodore Sailing and I look forward to working with the sailing team and Committee in this role.

- Recovering a capsized boat and crew
- Man Over Board MOB
- Holding off a buoy
- General handling in close quarters
- Safety Checks and crew briefing
- Safety on the Helford
- Specific risks in the Helford Channel/Bay and other vessels
- VHF use and correct phraseology.
- Emergency Procedures
